
## **DETROIT IN DEMOLITION**

A graphic image of what is happening in **Detroit**. In red, the points of the city in which licenses for building demolitions have been approved, compared to the licenses granted for new buildings (in blue). The <u>demolition</u> has been an option, at least there. According to the article<u>With so much</u> <u>space</u>, <u>so few options</u> -- <u>Detroit's vast vacant lots are a burden</u>, the city of Paris could enter the entire surface of Detroit's **empty or abandoned land**.

issue in Detroit and then we saw how social organizations and public authorities proposed <u>solutions</u> for this problem. However, the authorities seem to accept reality: barely a part of these lands and buildings will be able to be activated and most of them **will remain empty or without a specific use for years** because there is no comprehensive and short-term response term for such magnitude. The <u>zombie houses</u> they will be there for a long time.
