The phrase is attributed in the book to <u>Michel Replogle</u>, transportation specialist at the legal group <u>Environmental Defense</u>, previously quoted in a New York Times article, <u>The Cost of Urban Sprawl:</u> <u>Unplanned Obsolescence</u>. Oh, another thing.....

The book is from 2001 and reviewing it, I come to the conclusion that practically the entire text is still valid, with the exception of the statistics, which have become outdated.
