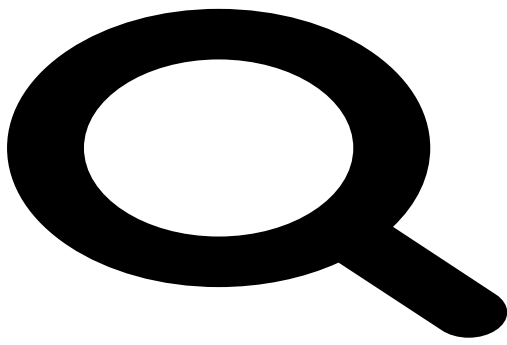


# **NATURE ADDRESSES THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CITIES AND SCIENCE**
