Regeneration also implies looking at ways of creating new jobs (that would last after the Olympics), training people in order to benefit from new opportunities, and more and better social services just to mention some of the aspects. Now, I would raise the last question: How much of those £9.3billion is being spent on that? I apologies if it doesn't sound very scientific but, in my opinion, "the regeneration obtained" might be directly proportional to the money invested in these sections.
